

Executive Summary

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The Economic Value of Southwestern Michigan College to the SMC Service Area







OUTHWESTERN MICHIGAN COLLEGE (SMC) creates value in many ways. The college plays a key role in helping students increase their employability and achieve their individual potential. The college draws students to the region, generating new dollars and opportunities for the SMC Service Area. SMC provides students with the education, training, and skills they need to have fulfilling and prosperous careers. Furthermore, SMC is a place for students to meet new people, increase their self-confidence, and promote their overall health and well-being.

SMC influences both the lives of its students and the regional economy. The college supports a variety of industries in the SMC Service Area, serves regional businesses, and benefits society as a whole in Michigan from an expanded economy and improved quality of life. Additionally, the benefits created by SMC extend to the state and local government through increased tax revenues and public sector savings.

This study measures the economic impacts created by SMC on the business community and the benefits the college generates in return for the investments made by its key stakeholder groups—students, taxpayers, and society. The following two analyses are presented:

Economic impact analysis

All results reflect employee, student, and financial data, provided by the college, for fiscal year (FY) 2022-23. Impacts on the SMC Service Area economy are reported under the economic impact analysis and are measured in terms of added income. The returns on investment to students, taxpayers, and society in Michigan are reported under the investment analysis.

For the purposes of this analysis, the SMC Service Area is comprised of the following counties in Michigan: Berrien, Van Buren, Cass, Kalamazoo, and St Joseph, and the following counties in Indiana: St Joseph and Elkhart.

Economic impact analysis



SMC promotes economic growth in the SMC Service Area through its direct expenditures and the resulting expenditures of students and regional businesses. The college serves as an employer and buyer of goods and services for its day-to-day operations and construction projects. The college's activities attract students from outside the SMC Service Area, whose expenditures benefit regional vendors. In addition, SMC is one of the primary sources of higher education to the SMC Service Area residents and a supplier of trained workers to regional industries, enhancing overall productivity in the regional workforce.

Operations spending impact


SMC adds economic value to the SMC Service Area as an employer of regional residents and a large-scale buyer of goods and services. In FY 2022-23, the college employed 331 full-time and part-time faculty and staff, 98% of whom lived in the SMC Service Area. Total payroll at SMC was \$15.16 million, much of which was spent in the region for groceries, mortgage and rent payments, dining out, and other household expenses. In addition, the college spent \$9.42 million on expenses related to facilities, supplies, and professional services (excluding construction).

SMC's operations spending added \$19.83 million in income to the region during the analysis year. This figure represents the college's payroll, the multiplier effects generated by the in-region spending of the college and its employees, and a downward adjustment to account for funding that the college received from regional sources. The \$19.83 million in added income is equivalent to supporting 377 jobs in the region.

Student spending impact

Around 8% of students attending SMC originated from outside the region in FY 2022-23, and some of these students relocated to the SMC Service Area to attend SMC. These students may not have come to the region if the college did not exist. In addition, some in-region students, referred to as retained students, would have left the SMC Service Area if not for the existence of SMC. While attending the college, these relocated and retained students spent money on groceries, accommodation, transportation, and other household expenses. This spending generated \$891.05 thousand in added income for the regional economy in FY 2022-23, which supported 17 jobs in the SMC Service Area.

Alumni impact

The education and training SMC provides for regional residents has the greatest impact. Since the establishment of the college, students have studied at SMC and entered the regional workforce with greater knowledge and new skills. Today, thousands of former SMC students are employed in the SMC Service Area. As a result of their education from SMC, the students receive higher earnings and increase the productivity of the businesses that employ them. In FY 2022-23, SMC alumni generated \$203.41 million in added income for the regional economy, which is equivalent to supporting 2,561 jobs.

Total impact

SMC added \$224.13 million in income to the SMC Service Area economy during the analysis year, equal to the sum of the operations spending impact, the student spending impact, and the alumni impact.

SMC's total impact can also be expressed in terms of jobs supported. The \$224.13 million impact supported 2,955 regional jobs, using the jobs-to-sales ratios specific to each industry in the region. In addition, the \$224.13 million, or 2,955 supported jobs, stemmed from different industry sectors. For instance, among non-education industry sectors, the spending of SMC and its students and the activities of its alumni in the Health Care & Social Assistance industry sector supported 497 jobs in FY 2022-23. If the college did not exist, these impacts would not have been generated in the SMC Service Area.

Investment analysis



An investment analysis evaluates the costs associated with a proposed venture against its expected benefits. The analysis presented here evaluates SMC as an investment from the perspectives of students, taxpayers, and society in Michigan. As with the economic impact analysis, this analysis considers only FY 2022-23 activities.

Student perspective

In FY 2022-23, SMC served 1,536 degree-seeking and 638 non-degree-seeking students. In order to attend the college, the students paid for tuition, fees, books, and supplies. Some students also took out loans and will incur interest on those loans. Additionally, students gave up money they would have otherwise earned had they been working instead of attending college. The total investment made by SMC's students in FY 2022-23 amounted to a present value of \$12.35 million, equal to \$7.25 million in out-of-pocket expenses (including future principal and interest on student loans) and \$5.10 million in forgone time and money.

In return for their investment, SMC's students will receive a stream of higher future earnings that will continue to grow throughout their working lives. For example, the average SMC associate degree graduate from FY 2022-23 will see annual earnings that are \$9,200 higher than a person with a high school diploma or equivalent working in Michigan. Over a working lifetime, the benefits of the associate degree over a high school diploma will amount to an undiscounted value of \$395,600 in higher earnings per graduate. The present value of the cumulative higher future earnings that SMC's FY 2022-23 students will receive over their working careers is \$65.25 million.

The students' benefit-cost ratio is 5.28. In other words, for every dollar students invest in SMC in the form of out-of-pocket expenses and forgone time and money, they will receive a cumulative value of \$5.28 in higher future earnings. Annually, the students' investment in SMC has an average annual internal rate of return of 18.11%, which is impressive compared to the U.S. stock market's 30-year average rate of return of 10.1%.



Taxpayer perspective

SMC generates more in tax revenue than it receives. These benefits to taxpayers consist primarily of taxes that the state and local government will collect from the added revenue created in the state. As SMC students will earn more, they will make higher tax payments throughout their working lives. Students' employers will also make higher tax payments as they increase their output

and purchases of goods and services. By the end of the FY 2022-23 students' working lives, the state and local government will have collected a present value of \$22.04 million in added taxes.

Benefits to taxpayers will also consist of savings generated by the improved lifestyles of SMC students and the corresponding reduced government services. Education is statistically correlated with a variety of lifestyle changes. The education that SMC students receive will generate savings in three main categories: 1) health care, 2) justice system,

and 3) income assistance. Improved health will lower students' demand for national health care services. In addition, costs related to the justice system will decrease. SMC students will be more employable, so their reduced demand for income assistance such as welfare and unemployment benefits will benefit taxpayers. Altogether, the present value of the benefits associated with an education from SMC will generate \$2.22 million in savings to state and local taxpayers.

Total taxpayer benefits amount to \$24.25 million, the present value sum of the added tax revenue and public sector savings. Taxpayer costs are \$15.02 million, equal to the amount of state and local government funding SMC received in FY 2022-23. These benefits and costs yield a benefit-cost ratio of 1.61. This means that for every dollar of public money invested in SMC in FY 2022-23, taxpayers will receive a cumulative present value of \$1.61 over the course of the students' working lives. The average annual internal rate of return for taxpayers is 3.17%, which compares favorably to other long-term investments in the public sector.

Social perspective

Society as a whole in Michigan benefits from the presence of SMC in two major ways. Primarily, society benefits from an increased economic base in the state. This is attributed to the added income from students' increased lifetime earnings (added student income) and increased business output (added business income), which raise economic prosperity in Michigan.

Benefits to society also consist of the savings generated by the improved lifestyles of SMC students. As discussed in the previous section, education is statistically correlated with a variety of lifestyle changes that generate social savings. Note that these costs are avoided by the consumers but are distinct from the costs avoided by the taxpayers outlined above. Health care savings include avoided medical costs associated with smoking, obesity, substance abuse, and depression. Justice system savings include

avoided costs to the government and society due to less judicial activity. Income assistance savings include reduced welfare and unemployment claims. For a list of study references, contact the college for a copy of the main report.

Altogether, the social benefits of SMC equal a present value of \$274.39 million. These benefits include \$182.61 million in added student income, \$68.66 million in added business income, \$16.11 million in added income from college activities, as well as \$7.01 million in social savings related to health, the justice system, and income assistance in Michigan. People in Michigan invested a present value total of \$32.16 million in SMC in FY 2022-23. The cost includes all the college and student costs.


The benefit-cost ratio for society is 8.53, equal to the \$274.39 million in benefits divided by the \$32.16 million in costs. In other words, for every dollar invested in SMC, people in Michigan will receive a cumulative value of \$8.53 in benefits. The benefits of this investment will occur for as long as SMC's FY 2022-23 students remain employed in the state workforce.

Summary of investment analysis results

The results of the analysis demonstrate that SMC is a strong investment for all three major stakeholder groups-students, taxpayers, and society. As shown, students receive a great return for their investments in an education from SMC. At the same time, taxpayers' investment in SMC returns more to government budgets than it costs and creates a wide range of social benefits throughout Michigan.

Conclusion

The results of this study demonstrate that SMC creates value from multiple perspectives.

The college benefits regional businesses by increasing consumer spending in the region and supplying a steady flow of qualified, trained workers to the workforce. SMC enriches the lives of students by raising their lifetime earnings and helping them achieve their individual potential. The college benefits state and local taxpayers through increased tax receipts and a reduced demand for government-supported social services. Finally, SMC benefits society as a whole in Michigan by creating a more prosperous economy and generating a variety of savings through the improved lifestyles of students.

About the study

Data and assumptions used in the study are based on several sources, including the FY 2022-23 academic and financial reports from SMC, industry and employment data from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics and U.S. Census Bureau, outputs of Lightcast's Multi-Regional Social Accounting Matrix model, and a variety of studies and surveys relating education to social behavior. The study applies a conservative methodology and follows standard practice using only the most recognized indicators of economic impact and investment effectiveness.
